7. Presentation and adoption of Annual Report and Statement of Accounts7.1 Annual Report

The Chairperson informed the meeting that the report summary and financials would be specifically spoken to but that she and the General Manager would happily answer any questions about any other area of the report. The Chair then briefly covered the highlights of the year before handing over to the General Manager to provide additional details and to present the annual financial reports.

Highlights for the year included an increase of 10,000 additional individual event participants due largely to the return of schools orienteering competitions to Auckland and a 50% increase in events run in the South Island. ONZ invested in a range of club-focused including a Coaches in Residence Programme that brought three overseas coaches to NZ, Controllers Clinics in the Northern and Southern Regions, national development camps, training camps. ONZ also ran club and Presidents Forums during the year. Internationally we fielded national teams at 7 international events and produced some pleasing results with our best ever Men's Forest Relay at the World Championships, best ever Mixed Sprint Relay at a World Cup, best ever Individual Placing at a Junior World Championships (WOC) Long Event with a 5th from Zefa Fa'avae. Other notable results included 8th and 9th Forest Relay Placings for the Men's and Women's JWOC as well as a 6th in the Individual Sprint Women's Sprint by Penelope Salmon.

The General Manager spoke the statement of financial performance and statement of financial position, highlighting that a budgeted \$14,000 loss had turned into a nearly \$54,000 surplus. He explained that while the budget was set during a time of financial uncertainty, improved global financial markets (interest on Milford investment and term savings accounts), additional event levies (a result of increased participation), one-off Covid and Integrity funding grants from Sport New Zealand, Grant Funding towards national camps, and a financial reclassification of the annual database payment were the key reasons for the result. He explained that the database payment had incorrectly been attributed to the financial period the invoice was generated rather than the period it was for. This practice had been in place since the database was adopted. To correct this, the payment for 2024 will be included in the 2024 accounts meaning no payment appears in the 2023 financial statements under database other than a small database limit upgrade for Auckland allowing them to have more than 500 members on their database.



A question was asked around what items sat under the Performance Initiatives Expenditure line item. The GM explained that this included the running of the ANZAC development camp, IOF Athlete Licences, the reimbursement of airfares for a national team coach who chose to stand down Following the naming of a former partner in the team. It was also brought to the

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attention of the meeting that there was also Performance Initiative Revenue offsetting this expense.

Following the discussion, the Chairperson asked for the meeting to officially approve the Annual Report including the Annual Financial Statements.

- He has led major projects for our club and ONZ, including NZ Mountain Bike O champs, the ONZ long term strategy as well as President's and Club Forums and has championed member engagement.

8.2 Life Membership

Malcolm Ingham (RK)

- For services as ONZ's Performance Leader over a 8-9 year period. Malcolm has spent countless hours of his own time helping out otherwise minimally assisted athletes and providing resources and training opportunities at a very high level compared to other countries high performance systems. Something that Malcolm has never been willing to accept payment for.
- Malcolm has been responsible for establishing the U23 Camp and National Sprint League, was the mastermind behind the creation of the Oceania Sprint Championships, and has overseen nearly a decade of World Orienteering Championship Teams.
- Malcolm has produced ONZ's High Performance plan and has been instrumental in forming and expanding a relationship with High Performance Sport NZ providing benefits for our nationally and internationally based athletes. He has also championed Prime Minister's scholarships, part of the reason that Orienteers have received a disproportionate amount of funding through this programme in recent years.
