General Manager and Chairman's report

Growing the sport, ambitious goals to 2030

Future focus

A key focus of the Board was future planning and the improvement of current policy. During the year a number of additional roles were added, the process to review our Health and Safety Policy started, and a new Junior and Schools Strategy was adopted. Sitting above these changes are our new three-year business plan and five-year strategic plan that help pave the direction for orienteering up to 2030. The new strategic plan boldly sets aspirational goals for our sport including having 80,000 annual participants and 5,000 club members by 2030. Also included in these goals is hosting the 2029 Junior World Championships (JWOC), a goal that was one step closer at year's end when New Zealand officially submitted an application to host JWOC 2029.

Continued growth

Club membership rose by 6.78% to an all-time high of 3,559 members. At the same time event participation increased by just over 1.7%. Although the number of events run by clubs dropped slightly, the average event attracted about 131 competitors, the second highest rate on record.

Performance at international events

The Oceania Championships hosted by Wellington were one of the first events of the year boasting the 3 largest foot-orienteering events of the year. New Zealanders dominated the Oceania leader board placing first in the 14 out of 16 of the elite events, the only events eluding us was the W20E Sprint and Long titles! A successful World Games campaign in China resulted in a 4th in the individual sprint for Tim Robertson and a 5th overall in the





mixed relay. Tim also placed a credible 6th in the Sprint at the World Cup 2 Event in Belgium. Other notable results included Jake McLellan's 7th place in the Junior World Championships Mens Sprint in Italy. Despite 13 podium places, New Zealand had to settle for a draw with Australian Capital Territory in this year's Southern Cross Challenge. This was the first time that a name other than New Zealand is engraved in the trophy!

Solid financial performance

Orienteering New Zealand's 2025 budget recognised growing costs for overseas trips and increased the subsidy for team coaches and managers for the all subsidised international events to try and ensure that athletes do not have to subsidise coaches and managers attending these events. Despite these increased budget items, Orienteering New Zealand's total equity rose by \$72,658. This was primarily attributed to interest revenue from long term bank deposits and

investments, a 10.2% increase in event levy income from the previous year, and staff expenses being well below what were anticipated.

Additional support roles

During the year Callum Wishart was appointed to help alleviate the administrative burden on the Technical Committee. Callum was also appointed to oversee the administration for the National Orienteering League and the National Sprint League. Marcus Diprose has taken on the new role of Major Events Support. This role is responsible for liaising with the clubs to ensure that their major events are on track and to provide shared resources and facilitate expertise where needed. Neill McGowan was appointed Regional Development Officer for the Tūāraiki (Northern) region. In this role he oversees development for elite and pre-elite athletes that collectively make up the Northern Knights training squad.





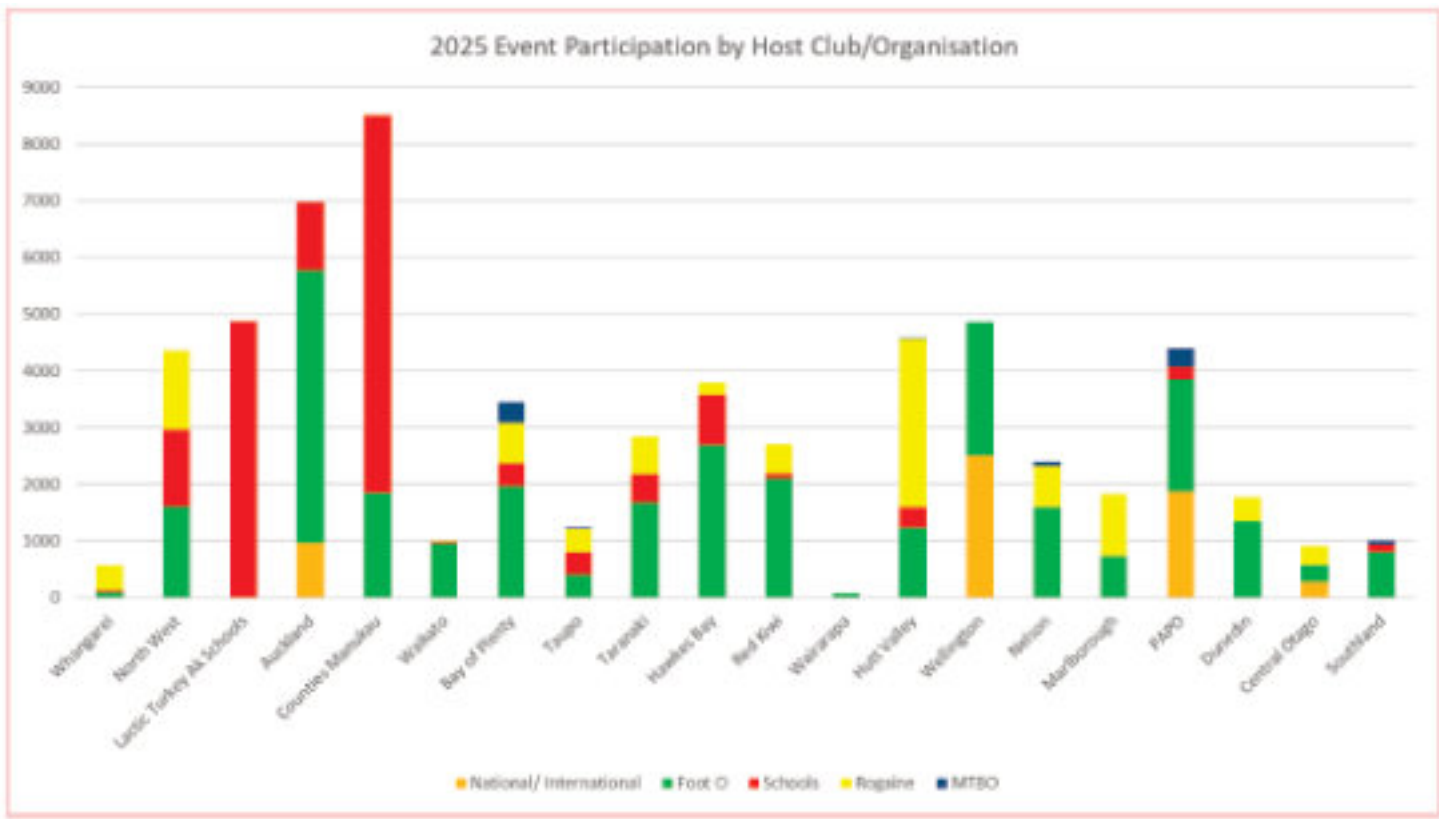

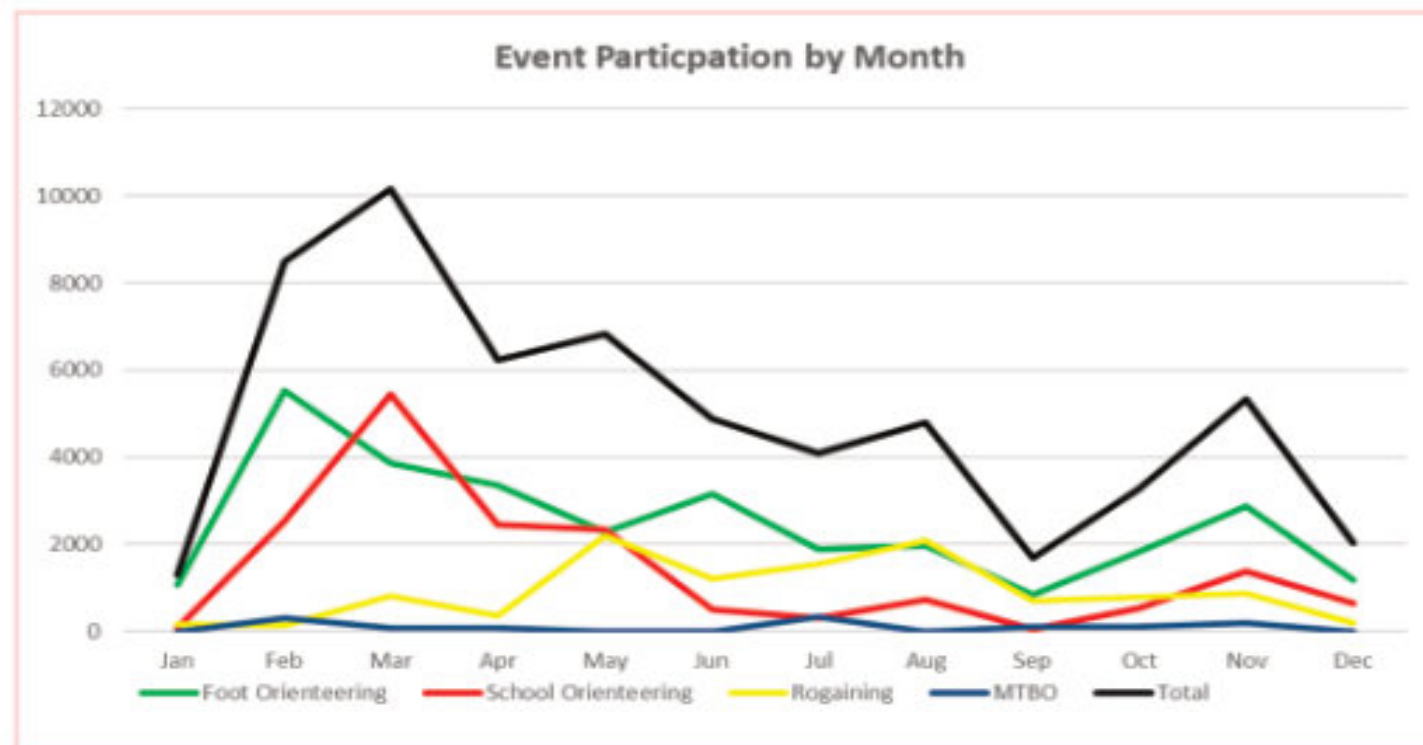

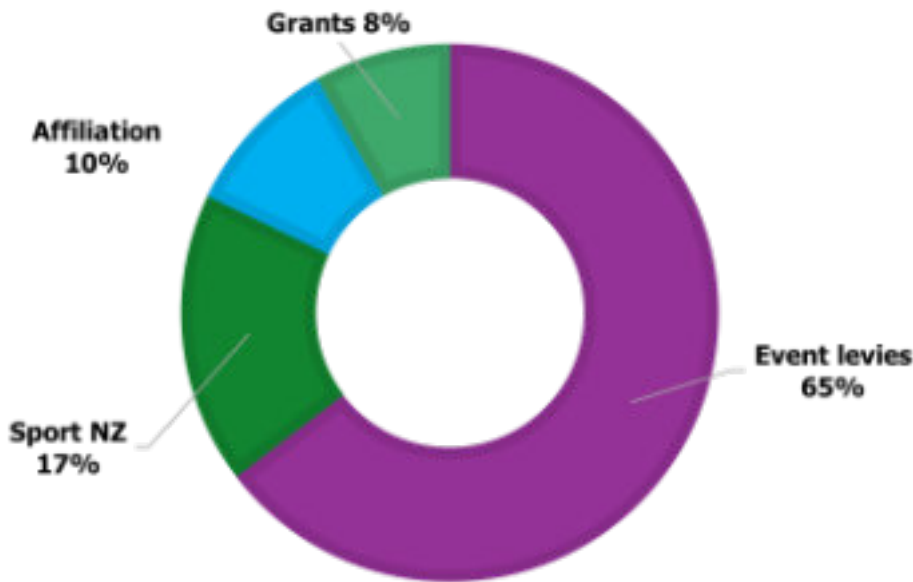
At a glance | Participation by month



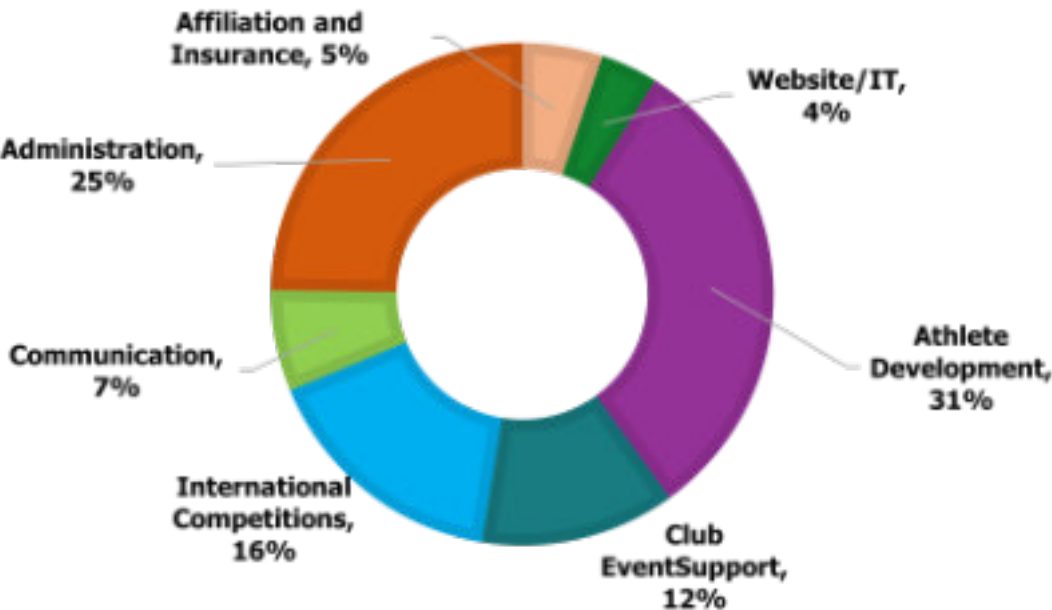


At a glance | Expenditure and revenue

Event participation





Fewer events, but more participants

Membership rose for the fourth consecutive year reaching a record 62,000+ participants. Total events held were nearly identical to last year, suggesting clubs are hosting larger events — maximising efficiency.

Membership across the country rose for the fourth time in four years, reaching a membership record of over 62,000 individual event participants. At the same time, total event numbers dropped to nearly 0.6% indicating that on average clubs were hosting less events with slightly larger participant numbers.

The Pokapū (Central) region was the key contributor to increased growth with a staggering 29.9% increase in even participants during 2025. A key contributor to this was Wellington hosting the Oceania Championships in January where the four events averaged 626 participants. In comparison, participation in the Tūāraiki (Northern) region and Taitonga (Southern) regions both experienced declines.

52.6% of events run in 2025 were foot orienteering, 28.9% were school events (not included in other categories), 17.6% were rogaine, and 1.8% were mountain bike orienteering. The biggest participation events were centred around multi-day major events and a couple of large rogaine events.





Steady upward membership trend

Membership growth continues its upward trend with the under 20 years age group making up 37.8% of total membership numbers

Membership across the country rose by 6.8% to 3,559. This rise on the back of last year's record high membership illustrates continued steady growth in our sport in the post-Covid era.

Of our three regions, Tūāraiki (Northern) and Pokapū (Central) had increases of 11% and 14% respectively while Taitonga experienced a 2.3% decrease in membership. Most notable of the club increases were Whangarei whose membership rose from 34 members to 85, an increase of 150%. Other clubs with impressive increases included Waikato, Counties Manukau, and Taranaki that all reached membership highs with increases of between 28-32% during 2025.

In 2025, Juniors (under 20yrs) made up 37.8% of total membership numbers. This continues a very gradual increase in junior membership resulting in 2.6% more of Orienteering New Zealand's membership being juniors than 5 years ago. With the launch of the new Junior and School Strategy in late 2025 and the initiatives supporting this plan from 2026, we can expect both junior membership and membership as a whole will continue to trend up-wards.

Membership remains gender balanced with approximately 50% female and 50 male, and 0.2% non-binary members. Senior membership is more heavily weighted towards female members (51.8% female, 48.1% male) whereas junior membership sees higher male membership (46.6% female, 53.2% male).





Houghton's Bush Camp a huge success!

Bursting with energy, ONZ's youth development is in a strong position as Junior Camp 2025 was the biggest since Covid

Junior Camp 2025 was the largest since Covid, with 69 young people, 13 junior coaches, and a dedicated team of adult helpers filling Houghton's Bush Camp to capacity. Participants were kept busy with a wide range of orienteering activities around camp, in Woodhill Forest and at local sprint venues.

The number of junior coaches allowed most training groups to have two coaches assigned to them, with the lead coach, Nathan Borton, moving between groups and managing logistics. Participants ranged from confident orange-level runners transitioning to red, through to prospective JWOC candidates refining their skills under pressure. Alongside the serious training in the forest and at sprint venues, camp based activities took a more light-hearted approach to improving orienteering skills. Having a campsite with an adventure playground and bush on all sides allowed the coaches to devise some highly entertaining events (for both participants and onlookers). These included punching races with controls at the top of climbing frames, night memory rogaining, where a stationary partner had to describe the control locations to a runner, and the mythical Norwegian control description training. Susanna Carryer reports that on the completion of the camp, every orienteer came away with a new kete of skills and ideas to improve their performance.





Southern Cross Challenge

NZ team shares trophy with Australian team for the first time in a tightly contested challenge



The Southern Cross Challenge 2025 was much closer competition than ever before. We came away relieved that NZ still has our name on the trophy every year, even if we had to share it with an Australian team for the first time ever. The overall results saw NZ Hārua and the Australian ACT team tied at the top, with NZ Karahiwi not too far behind in third place. The closer competition reflects growing depth and breadth in junior orienteering across both countries, and is therefore to be celebrated.

Brisbane heat was a major challenge for all competitors and illness impacted particularly in the NZ Karahiwi team with two

senior girls unable to compete and Coach Michael Croxford unable to participate for much of the week. There were some outstanding individual results in both the Australian Champs and the ASOC events.

Social activities included a group visit to a waterpark and a themed costume evening on the final night, both of which were well received by participants. New Zealand Southern Cross school team manager Susanna Carryer recounts that sharing accommodation with Australian teams created some logistical challenges, but also created an environment for developing friendships with other teams.





Rogaining

This year 13 clubs hosted 91 rogaine events attracting more than 18,000 individual participants

2025 may mark a significant transition, with Matt Bixley (PAPO) stepping down as President of the International Rogaining Federation after seven years in the role.

In the the high-performance space, we witnessed the rise of some younger participants having stellar results. At the World Championships in Burgos, Spain. Will Tidswell (HBOC) and Fergus O'Neill (PAPO) won Youth Mens and finished 8th Overall making them the first youth team to ever finish in the top 10. Fergus followed that with a 2nd overall at the National Championships which were won by another team just out of youth grades, Tiian and Jonty McKinnel.

Rolf Boswell and Waikato hosted a new concept with a "Short Course" National Championships alongside the associated New Zealand Schools Rogaining Championships. Auckland Grammar, Mt Albert Grammar, Havelock North and Napier Boys all found a top spot on the podium in the 4 hour event. A competitive field in the 8 hour event justified trying this new event while it also re-introduced a championship-level rogaine back into the North Island.



Mountain bike orienteering

MTBO delivers a strong year at home and abroad



MTBO in 2025 got off to a great start with the New Zealand Championships held in Alexandra and Naseby in February. Of particular note was the Middle Distance held on the Matangi Station map (a.k.a. Linger and Die) which was described as unapologetically raw and rocky.

Seven clubs, held MTBO events with a range of formats from informal or MapRun courses, standard MTBO, night MTBO and rogaines from 1 to 6 hours duration.

Internationally, eight Kiwis competed in the Australian MTBO championships. New Zealand athletes competed in Europe in the World Masters MTBO series where Deb Bain won the W65 class in the World Masters Championship Mass Start event. In the overall series W65 grade Deb finished 2nd and Sally Dickson placed 3rd.

The MTBO Committee has decided to trial the IOF MTBO mapping specs at the 2026 NZ MTBO Champs. If adopted, these specs would align New Zealand with most other countries and enable kiwi athletes competing internationally, as well as visiting athletes, to get familiar with common mapping specifications and practices.





Regional development

Northern - Auckland

Over 25 active members participated in numerous camps and intense training weekends. Led out by Nathan Borton, and with reciprocal help from Southerly Storm a lot of planning and setting trainings took place across the region. Camps have included: training camps around the Katoa Po weekend, in Rotorua and Taupo, summer sprints weekend around Auckland, multi-sprint weekend with knockouts, JWOC, EYOC and WUOC trials preparation weekend, Neill McGowan reports a 250% increase in membership over the past 12 months, noting that the 'Heja' App has contributed positively to social cohesion and culture-building.

Southern - Christchurch

A new app called 'Heja' to organise trainings, potlucks and events. Heidi Stolberger noted that a strength and conditioning programme was piloted with local personal trainers early in the year, however scheduling conflicts arising from busy calendars and competing commitments such as trials made it difficult to sustain. A large number joined up with the Nelson group to attend a joint Southerly Storm training camp in Nelson in March.



Numbers continued to grow with a great team culture enabling over 150 trainings (mix of orienteering, running and related activities) and 7 potlucks throughout the year.

Southern - Nelson

The Nelson region hosted a very successful training camp in St Arnaud including 15 participants coming from around the South Island for 2 days of physical, technical, and mental training. Scott Smith reports that this flowed on to group runs and workouts in the lead up to several members of the squad racing overseas in Europe. The Nelson region has recently welcomed newcomers from other areas of the country to bolster the squad and are excited to keep things going into 2026.



Capability and resources





Coaching and resources

The quality of a participant's experience shapes whether they stay, improve, and ultimately whether they recommend the sport to others.. Coaching and resources they are the core infrastructure that helps determine how the sport grows,

Coaching

The coaching focus for this year was on supporting key individuals to progress their aims. Typically this involved education and training in adjacent domains of the sport, such as course planning, OCAD and mapping.

Resources

A complete set of answer books was completed to go with the coaching workbooks, allowing coaches and individuals to assess themselves. There is now a substantial set of coaching resources for clubs and schools to leverage.

As coaches became comfortable with the knowledge contained in the coaching resources, it became clear that the major hurdles for leading coaches were now computer skills (mainly OCAD, Condes and Purple Pen) and course setting ability. Proactive coaches wanted to update maps and set training courses for their groups. To assist, course planning guides, presentations and challenges were created for clubs, planners, controllers and coaches to improve their understanding of competition rules, course quality and smart ways to approach this essential job.





Controllers clinics

Two controllers clinics were run this year, one in Auckland during in June, and a second one in Nelson during August. Alister Metherell oversaw both clinics. These clinics continue Orienteering New Zealand's approach of trying to hold clinics in two of the three orienteering regions annually.

New IOF Senior Event Advisors (SEA)

Four Kiwi orienteers were able to travel to Australia to gain their International Orienteering Federation (IOF) Senior Event Advisor (SEA) qualification this year. SEAs are required to oversee World Ranking Events (WRE) which provide our top athletes with World Ranking Points during events like the Oceania Championships, our National Championships, and King Birthday. We welcome Michael Croxford (Nelson), Alister Metherell (PAPO), Malcolm Ingham (Red Kiwis), and Tane Cambridge (PAPO) who join existing SEAs Gillian Ingham (Wellington), Marquita Gelderman (North West) and Graham Teahan (Red Kiwis).





Tax guidelines for clubs

At the request of clubs wanting information on their tax obligations making payments to volunteers and contractors, a Tax Guidelines for Clubs document was developed. The document was produced with input from a Tax specialist and the IRD. Whilst not specifically presented as advice, it was designed to help clubs more easily understand navigate relevant tax obligations for the different types of payments including services, expenses, recognitions, and honoria.

Schools and Junior Development strategy

Having identified schools orienteering and junior development as a key strategic priority, a significant piece of work was initiated in 2025 to bring together the different strands and insights generated through, working groups, forums and documents, into a cohesive path. The resulting strategy document for Junior Development and Schools Orienteering provides greater clarity for ONZ and clubs on how best to grow these critical areas.

Included in the document are intentions to increase participation in orienteering in schools from year 7 and up, as well as a focus on participation and fun. Junior Development brings an age appropriate development framework which guides the progression of juniors in the sport, with a focus on skills, development, support and performance. The new strategies builds off the excellent work which clubs have undertaken for years, and introduces a national model that club initiatives can dovetail into. A resource model accompanying the policy is being developed with the ONZ Board committed to funding for 2026 and beyond.





Mapping & quality events

A tribute to a decade of mappers as functions merge into new Technical and Mapping Committee

The Mapping Committee was formally established in 2015 after an Orienteering New Zealand strategic review. In 2025 the Committee was disestablished in 2025 and integrated with the Technical Committee to form into the new Technical and Mapping Committee. Significant projects completed by the Mapping Committee included: a review and consolidation of mapping resources available within New Zealand, providing guidance on the transition to new international mapping standards, sharing developments in new base map and cartography tools, and developing a forum for sharing and seeking advice on mapping.

New positions help safeguard our quality events

Callum Wishart was appointed to the Technical Committee Support Role late in the year but is already making an impact. By providing administrative support to the volunteering Technical Committee we have already increased the ability to process A and B Grade controller applications and A-Grade Event applications. The appointment of Marcus Diprose to the Major Event Support position has provided clubs hosting major events with additional support and access to resources and expertise.

Performance and achievement



High Performance review

New Zealand orienteering delivered outstanding international results, and consistent rankings across both men's and women's grades. Domestically, there is a growing depth within New Zealand

The 2026 High Performance year began with the Oceania Championships in Manawātū in January. Competition opened with a sprint race at Massey University before moving to technically demanding sand dune terrain for the forest events. New Zealand athletes delivered outstanding performances across all disciplines, with Lizzie Ingham winning all three individual events, while Joseph Lynch claimed the sprint title and Zefa Fa'avae secured both the middle and long distance titles. New Zealand also performed strongly in the relay events, taking both gold and silver in the elite grades, with the top two New Zealand teams outperforming the field and leading Australian teams relegated to bronze or lower.

The World Games took place in Chengdu, China in August in extremely hot conditions. Tragically, Italian athlete Mattia Debertolis collapsed during the middle distance race and passed away a few days later. This incident prompted further consideration by the IOF of guidelines for staging competitions in extreme heat. New Zealand athletes performed strongly, highlighted by Tim Robertson's fourth-place finish in the middle distance and the sprint relay team's fifth place.

Fifteen athletes represented New Zealand across the three World Cup rounds, with the best performances coming in Round 2 where Tim Robertson was once again on the podium in sixth place in the individual sprint event.





Domestically, New Zealand hosted nine World Ranking Events, three sprint and six forest races, across the Oceania and New Zealand Championships and the King's Birthday three-day event.

Several athletes achieved top-100 world rankings in 2025: Tim Robertson (sprint and forest), Joseph Lynch (sprint and forest), Zefa Fa'avae (forest), Laura Robertson (sprint), and Lizzie Ingham (sprint).

One of our high performance targets is to strengthen depth, measured by maintaining at least ten male and ten female athletes with World Ranking points above 5500 in both sprint and forest disciplines. This target was achieved for men in 2025. The women came close, with eight athletes exceeding this threshold in the forest rankings and nine in the sprint rankings. This growing depth contributed to improved Nations Federation League results, with the women reaching a high of 11th place and the men peaking at 14th. Over the course of the year, both the men and women consistently ranked within the top 15 nations.

The High Performance Camp was hosted by the Auckland region, beginning with a weekend of sprint-focused training followed by three days of technically challenging sessions in Woodhill Forest. Around 25 athletes participated, benefiting from sprint course planning led by Tim Robertson and Briana Steven, alongside forest training supported by Jenni Adams and international coaches Anna Taksdal and Hedda Karner Grooss. High-quality training terrain and excellent logistics support were made possible through the efforts of Kieran Woods, Nadia Clark, and Martin Crosby, along with the generous hosting from Joanna and Alistair Stewart.





World Orienteering Championships review

The World Orienteering Championships were held in the Kuopio region of Finland in July. The terrain was characteristic of Scandinavia, featuring intricate contour detail, rocky ground, and highly variable runnability. The New Zealand team combined youth and experience, with five of the nine selected athletes still under 21, highlighting the programme's developing depth.

The middle qualification took place on a steep slope overlooking the town of Tahko. Courses began near the top of the slope in complex terrain before transitioning into faster, downhill running. The standout performance came from Zefa Fa'avae, who placed third in his heat, just six seconds behind world number one Kasper Fosser. Fa'avae was joined in qualifying for the final by Tim Robertson and Rachel Baker, with Baker's composed performance particularly impressive given her age. Several other New Zealand athletes were in contention to qualify but were ultimately undone by small errors.

The middle and long distance finals were held in undulating forest near Kuopio. The middle distance demanded disciplined direction through areas where vague terrain punished any lapse in accuracy. The long distance, by contrast, featured sustained

physical effort and a number of long, challenging route choice legs.

The men's performances marked a clear step forward, with all achieving top-30 finishes and recording career-best forest results. Joseph Lynch and Zefa Fa'avae finished just seconds apart in 21st and 22nd respectively in the long distance final. The women's results did not quite match this level overall, although the top performance came from Rachel Baker, who placed 38th in the middle final.

The relay took place in forest surrounding Kuopio's ski jump arena, including a steep ridge that created several "over or around" route choice challenges. The men's team delivered a historic performance, finishing 9th, the first time New Zealand has broken into the top ten in the WOC men's relay, thanks to strong runs from Fa'avae, Lynch, and Robertson. The women's team was also tracking well for a top-15 finish, but unfortunately Kaia Joergensen mispunched. Her GPS showed she visited the control site, but she was likely caught out by a common Finnish feature where the punching unit can be positioned some distance from the control flag, leading her to punch the flag rather than the unit.

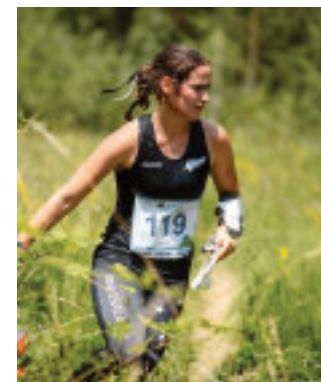
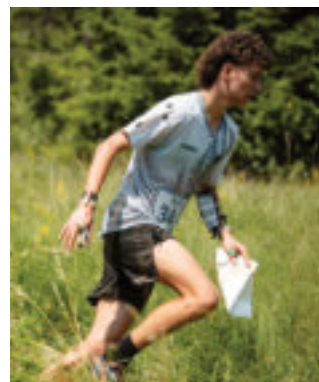
Heat and hills — New Zealand at JWOC 2025

The Junior World Orienteering Championships in Trentino, Italy saw New Zealand retain its top-ten nations league ranking, placing 9th based on the top three men and women across all races.

The championships opened with the sprint relay in park and urban terrain. Both New Zealand teams tried hard in very hot conditions, with team New Zealand 2 narrowly edging New Zealand 1 in a close contest, with the two teams finishing less than a minute apart.

In the individual sprint, the more technical setting of the old town, featuring steep, narrow streets and complex route choice, suited our athletes well. Jake McLellan produced a standout performance to place 7th and Felix Hunt reaffirmed his position as one of New Zealand's most consistent sprinters with a 12th place. New Zealand was one of only two nations to place three men inside the top 30; the second-best performing nation in the men's sprint.

The long distance tested athletes with heat, sustained climbing, and physically demanding terrain. Our team performed strongly,



showing composed navigation, with Felix Hunt and Rachel Baker leading the way in 17th and 21st respectively.

The middle distance was run in blisteringly hot conditions, with detailed forest terrain like that found in Scandinavia. However some of the vegetation proved to be less penetrable than mapped which lead to time losses for some of the New Zealand team. Felix Hunt and Rachel Baker were once again our top performers.

The forest relay, held in similar terrain to the middle distance, provided an exciting conclusion to the week. Both the men's and women's teams delivered consistent performances, each finishing 15th.





Leaderboard and National league

The 2025 National Orienteering League results

The TrailBlaze National Orienteering League and National Sprint League are season-long competitions designed to drive performance standards and strengthen the depth and competitiveness of domestic racing. In 2025, NOL traversed the best of NZ orienteering terrain from the Manawatū sand dunes, to native beech forest in Waikaia, to new North Canterbury sand dunes and limestone farm and forest, to classic Hawkes Bay farmland terrain with rock and intricate contours.

First-year senior Zefa Fa'avae was the dominant winner of the men's competition, taking out the first two rounds of the NOL and never placing lower than second in any event he contested. Lizzie Ingham won every race she entered, but an incomplete series allowed Kaia Joergensen to claim the overall title, demonstrating impressive consistency across the full range of New Zealand terrain. Lara Molloy and Renee Beveridge completed the women's podium, while Felix Hunt and Joseph Lynch rounded out the men's.

Joseph Lynch opened the National Sprint League strongly, winning the early rounds, but planning commitments for the

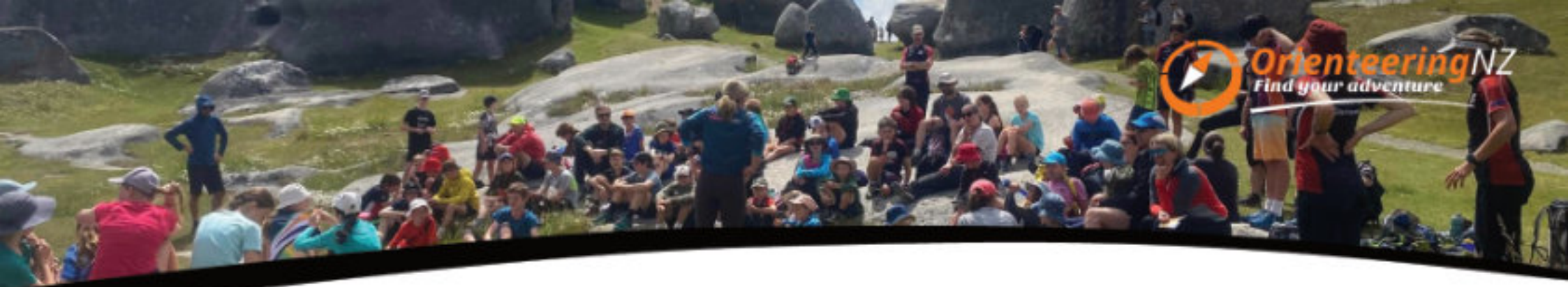

A year of strategic renewal and investment in orienteering's future

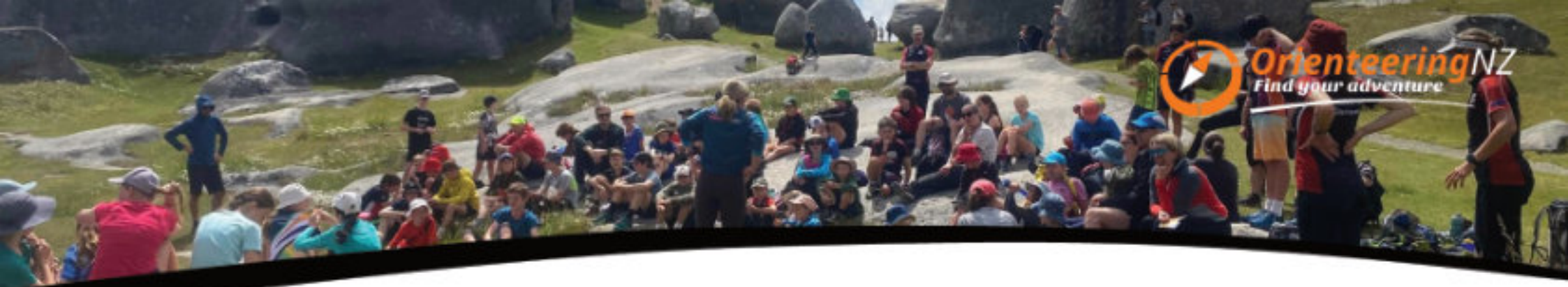
The main focus for the Board in 2025 was refreshing the strategic plan. It was a year of purposeful progress for Orienteering New Zealand, reflecting on the past five years while strengthening our strategic direction, ensuring inclusivity, and investing in junior and schools pathways.

A significant priority for the Board has been the refresh of the strategy. The process drew on wide discussion in the board and

throughout the sport with members and club representatives at two forums, using informal conversations across the year, and from consultation and surveys carried out in previous years. The refreshed five-year strategy captures our aspirations for the sport, supported by a business plan that sets out the practical steps we will take to help clubs, orienteers, and organisers enjoy the sport.

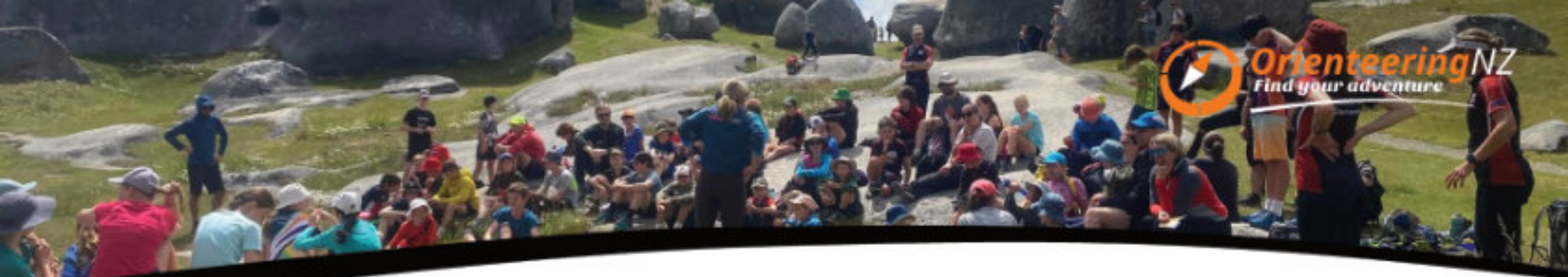


Throughout the year, the Board gave careful consideration to school-age participants in orienteering. Strategies to support orienteers who are school-aged were developed with key support from a group of members around the country. The Junior and School Strategies helped inform investment in the 2026 business plan, also reflecting a priority from clubs for ONZ support to further growth school and junior participation.

Changes to the rules of School Sport New Zealand required the Board to carefully consider our role in ensuring fair and equitable access to participation and competition opportunities. The Board has worked through the complexities of eligibility, participation, and selection. This has included specific consideration of how home-schooled students may participate in events and be eligible for selection, including for the Southern Cross team. While not all aspects are straightforward, the Board remains committed to enabling opportunities for young people to engage, enjoy and excel in orienteering.

I would like to acknowledge the time, passion and commitment of my fellow Board members. And from the Board a massive thank you to all the club officials, volunteers, ONZ staff and volunteers and team officials, it is through your dedication, attention to detail and energy that makes the experiences of orienteers in New Zealand fabulous and a sport that is growing in New Zealand.





Navigating the digital landscape

Results, friendly rivalry, and the rise of OZone are all keeping us well connected

Orienteering New Zealand enjoyed strong digital visibility this year, beginning with the IOF spotlight on Oceania and continuing through a series of internationally followed performances. Jake McLellan's 7th place at the JWOC individual sprint generated huge online support, while the full WOC team drew a strong following, with three finishing in the top 30 in the men's long distance and a 9th in the relay. Tim Robertson delivered a nail-biting 6th at the Orienteering World Cup 2 in Hasselt and an agonising 4th at the World Games middle, just 21 seconds off the podium. Felix's gold at O-Ringen was equally celebrated online.

It was not only pure orienteering that captivated audiences — Fergus O'Neill and Will Tidswell's World Rogaining Championship win drew strong media engagement, and adventure sports such as mountain running, Godzone, and mountain biking all attracted dedicated followers online, reflecting how orienteers gravitate to any activity requiring navigation and thinking on the move. Youth sport also united communities, bringing competitors, their peers and supporters together building a growing online following within the sport. Global trends confirm that digital and social platforms have overtaken TV and print for sports consumption, and since orienteering has not traditionally generated large media, creating specific orienteering content grows our audience steadily alongside membership.

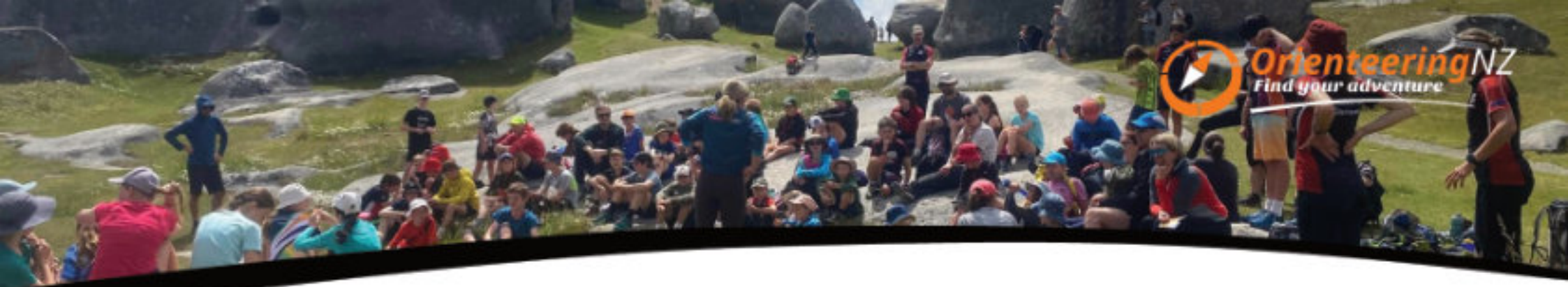

Streaming major international events from home, even at 2:30am, became the norm, with IOF figures showing more fans watching live each year. Social media remained the go-to for following teams overseas, with links to results shared widely.

For orienteers, reviewing the map and comparing placings after an event is essential, and social media proved equally eager to share results and highlights. O-Zone was built to deliver exactly the detailed, timely results that orienteers demand. First conceived in 2024 and piloted ahead of Nationals in 2025, it filled a gap by bringing results together in one place, seeing record usage during the Pokapū and Tūāraki Champs towards the end of 2025. Beyond results, it has calculated series, OY scores and generated leaderboards such as the National Orienteering League. It also helped a club identify active members to prompt re-joining. Like social media, Ozone personalises the user experience but may prove to be more usefully addictive.





Club engagement

Club forums reveal the diversity of orienteering nationwide, shaping our strategic direction

The Presidents and Club Leaders forums are important avenues for the Board to hear views from across the country. This year we focused the two sessions on discussions on the draft strategic plan and the direction of the junior and school strategies.

The discussion at both the forums is invaluable for the Board and informed a different emphasis in the subsequent version of the Strategic plan.

Discussions at the President's Forum highlighted the considerable diversity across clubs nationwide, reflecting differences in event approaches, landowner relationships, organisational challenges, club size, and levels of technical expertise



Financial reports



Financials

ONZ's financial position strengthened in 2025, with equity rising. This has been driven by staff savings, higher levy revenue, investment growth, and lower-than-expected international trip and camp costs. A new reporting format required by the Incorporated Societies Act means this year's accounts will look different from previous years.

As part of the obligations associated with the new Incorporated Societies Act, Orienteering New Zealand must report to the new External Reporting Board (XRB) tier three requirements prescribed by the government. These requirements do not allow many of the budget lines previously reported in our financial reports. As a result, the reports that follow are in a different format to recent years and the notes section has been extended to try and provide more clarity to stakeholders.

Orienteering New Zealand remains in a sound financial position. A higher than budgeted surplus was achieved of \$72,658. This was primarily a result of a mix of unplanned underspend and revenue gains, associated with five budget areas – lower than expected staff expenditure (approx. \$29K), increased levy returns as our participation numbers increase, investment gains, and reduced national camp costs aided by successful grant

applications and lower than budgeted catering costs. This was a combination of new roles that were budgeted to start at the beginning of the year being only confirmed in the last quarter, existing roles requiring less hours, and a couple of contract roles being re-evaluated as the Board established our new strategic direction for the next five years.

Investments grew by approximately \$28,000. These figures represent both a steady growth of long term bank investments which rose by \$7,870, and funds being managed by Milford Investments that rose by \$20,011.

Compared to the 1.4% increase in event participation nationally, a 10.2% increase in event levy revenue indicated that the average cost of attending an orienteering event rose slightly during 2025.

Larger subsidies were budgeted for international trips in recognition that the cost of travelling continues to increase. Each year these trips fluctuate based on where in the world they are held and the cost of things like food, accommodation and airfares. Orienteering New Zealand continues to strive to cover the costs of team management and coaches for four target events and subsidises the entry fees for World Cup athletes with a tiered structure of support. In 2025 support for the Junior World Orienteering Championships was \$14,775 (\$15,000 budgeted), \$12,107 was spent in support of the Southern Cross Challenge (\$15,000 budgeted), \$11,000 for the World Orienteering Championships (\$11,000 budgeted), and \$3,100 for the World Games (\$2,000 budgeted). World Cup entry support totaled \$5,200.

Grants provided by NZCT and Pub Charity, Orienteering New Zealand camp subsidies, and Junior Camp catering from our Auckland Orienteering Club members Chris and Norm Jager combined to make the National Camps extremely good value with the Junior Camp reaching its maximum number of participants for the first time since Covid.
